Floyd Boze has been featured in the last two issues of this newsletter, bu I hope you will indulge your editor once more. Floyd has been an inspi ation to me and others in this club. have known Floyd for nearly half m life. Over that time, he has set an example of what it means to be a



Rotarian and a great human being. Many times, Floyd has shared some his Rotary stories with me. He didn't accomplish 59 years of perfect attendance without making up missed meetings at Rotary clubs around the world. Sometimes, in other countries, Nancy, Floyd's wife, had to sit in the lobby of the hotel while Floyd attended the meeting there because they didn't allow women at their meetings. Following is my favorite story, because it illustrates how Rotary fellowship and the ideals of Rotary reach beyond politics and political boundaries. I firmly believe that if every world leader was a Rotarian, there would be no war. Several years ago, at the Rotary District Conference in San Antonio, some of us were sitting in the SCRC hospitality room a the end of a long day, just unwinding, and Floyd told this story: When World War II ended, Floyd and Nancy stayed in Germany as part of the occupying forces. They were quartered in a home commandeered from a German family. One night Floyd and Nancy were awakened by sounds coming from the basement. Captain Floyd USAF took a flashlight and his GI-issue .45 cal. pistol and carefully made his way toward the noise. In the basement, he encountered a man searching through items there. Holding the .45 on him, Floyd inquired of the man what he was doing. The man responded that he was a jeweler and the owner of the house. As such, he was retrieving some jewelry that he had hidden. Now, the best part — years later, in the mid-1980s, when Floyd was District Governor of Rotary District 589 (now 5890), *Floyd was attending a Governor's training conference* with other Rotary Governors from all over the world. A man approached Floyd and said "I think we have met before." Floyd didn't recognized him, but the man but he

said "I am the man you pointed a pistol at in Germany and demanded to know what I was doing in your basement." That man, now Governor of his Rotary District in Germany, was the owner of the house Floyd and Nancy were occupying. Those two men were once enemies sworn to kill each other in allegiance to their respective governments, but now they were Rotarians sworn to serve humanity and to promote peace around the world; to serve others above self, no matter what their ethnicity, creed or color. What a difference Rotary made in the lives of those men. Floyd, who eventually was promoted to bird Colonel in the armed forces of the United States of America, doing his duty in time of war, was now facing his enemy on common ground. Now brothers in Rotary International. Fellow Rotarians, this is Rotary in action. Thank you Floyd, for sharing. You truly are an inspiration.

ESSAY WINNER PERCEPTIVE BEYOND YEARS

The winner of the drug awareness essay contest cut directly to a pervasive problem in society: knowing what to do after we recognize that a person has an addiction issue or other mental health issue.

The average person can recognize a suffering soul. The administration and the students at Virginia Tech knew their classmate was mentally ill. They did not, however, know what to do about it. As concerned as they were, as worried as they were, they did not know what to do. This was true in Columbine, and on other campuses. Even after the tragic killings, they probably still do not know what to do.

Schools, churches, and other organizations really need to call on mental health experts to explain what to do for such a suffering individual, and what resources, if any, are available. The high school essay winner pointed this need out, as she described her struggle to know what to do about a classmate addicted to drugs.

John B. Lee Biography 2/03/08

WW-II: John Lee and his twin brother Keith grew up in a family of 5 children. Their Parents and Grandparents were Tenant Farmers in Virginia. They had lost their farms during the depression. In September of 1941, at the age of 17, John entered VPI (the Virginia Polytechnic Institute) at Blacksburg, Virginia. He majored in Mechanical Engineering and was in the Corp of Cadets. When he and his brother became 18 years old, they both went AWOL from VPI to get their noses operated on so that they could join the Air Corp. They both signed up in the Air Corp on the same day. John signed up in the Army Air Corp, and his brother Keith signed up in the Naval Air Corp. John was assigned to the Gulf Coast Training Command, in Texas. On March 15, 1944 at the age of 19, he received his Commission and his Wings as a Fighter Pilot, at Foster Field in Victoria, Texas. As a Fighter Pilot in WW-II, he flew 52 combat missions with the 8th Air Force, in England, in the P-51 Mustang Fighter Aircraft over Europe. He conducted High Altitude Escort Missions of the B-17 and B-24 Bombers, and he escorted the British Mosquito's on Photo Reconnaissance Missions over Czechoslovakia. He also conducted Strafing Missions of Airports, Trains and Train Marshalling Yards. He became

a Flight Commander. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, 6 Air Medals and 3 Battle Stars. The 3 battle stars included "The Battle of France", "The Battle of the Ardennes" (also known as "The Battle of the Bulge"), and for "The Battle of Europe".

NACA & NASA: After World War-II, John was reinstated at VPI (now Virginia Tech or VT). He received his Bachelors Degree in Mechanical Engineering with additional courses in Aeronautical Engineering. In 1948 John went to work for the NACA, (the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics) at Langley Field, Hampton, He was hired by Robert Gilruth, Chief of PARD, (the Pilotless Aircraft Research Division). John was assigned to the Propulsion and Aerodynamics Branch that included Max Faget. John was responsible for the development of the system and for the drop testing of Scale Modules of the Air Force Atomic Warheads from Supersonic Aircraft using the Wallops Island Preflight Jet Facility. He is the author and coauthor of 10 Research Memoranda and books. In 1958, President Eisenhower established NASA (the National Aeronautics and Space Administration). The NACA became the Nucleus for NASA that conducted the Manned Space Flight Program. Robert Gilruth organized and became the Chief of the Mercury Space Task Group that started the Manned Space Flight Program. John was one of the first 35 people assigned to the Mercury Space Task Group. On the Mercury Project, John was Chief of the Mechanical Systems Section. He was a lead Engineer on one of the 3 parallel feasibility studies conducted, to show that man could go to the moon, which became the Apollo Program. On the Apollo Program he became a Technical Assistant to Dr. Max Faget, the Director of E&D, (The Engineering Development Directorate), at the Johnson Space Flight Center. He was Head of the Directorates Program Offices for Mercury, Gemini and Apollo. He was on the Evaluation Committees that picked the contractors for the Mercury, and Apollo Spacecraft Programs. Also, as a lead engineer in E&D,

John was involved in the design concepts for:

- The Docking Module used for the docking of the Apollo Command & Service Module with the Russians Soyuz Spacecraft.
- Several Space Station Design Concepts.
- The concept for putting up the Space Station with the Shuttle Spacecraft.

Some of the awards received by John include:

- The NASA Group Achievement Awards for:
- Project Mercury, (the first US Manned Space Flights)
- The Apollo Operations Support Team: (for the first Apollo Flight)
- The Apollo 11 Program, (the first landing of man on the moon)
- The Snoopy Award: He received one of the first Snoopy awards presented by the Astronauts, from Neil Armstrong, the Commander of the Apollo 11 Crew for the first Manned Lunar Landing.

• The Presidential Medal of Freedom, to the Apollo XIII Operations Team: from President Richard Nixon

Certificates of Commendations for:

- Apollo11: The First Manned Lunar Landing.
- Apollo XIII Accident: For performance as the Lead Engineer in the Mission Evaluation Room from E&D, that leads to the successful return of the Astronauts.
- VT Cadet Corp WOF: He was the first person that has been inducted into the VT Cadet Corp Wall Of Fame for both Aviation and Aerospace.

John Lee has retired from NASA and now lives in Nassau Bay, Texas, just across the street from the Johnson Space Flight Center. He is on the Board of Directors for the Johnson Space Center NASA Alumni League and the Houston Chapter of Who's Who International. He is a member of the Space Center Rotary Club, NARFE, (the National Association of Retired Federal Employees). He has two daughters, Laurie and Dottie Mae.
