19 APRIL IS FOUNDER'S BIRTHDAY. Paul P. Harris, founder of Rotary International was born 114 years ago in Racine, Wisconsin, U.S.A., on 19 April. An innovator, a man for all seasons, Paul saw, by the time of his death on 27 January, 1947, his organization grow from a small group of business friends to a worldwide alliance of men dedicated to service.

This will honor the memory of Paul Harris, described by David Shelley Nicholl, editor of Rotary in GB&I, as "the man who, on an immortal impulse, put out with charming diffidence the hand that a million hands now grasp." APRIL, AN OPPORTUNE TIME TO DESIGNATE PAUL HARRIS FELLOWS. April, the month in which Paul Harris was born, is an appropriate time to honor Rotary's founder by enrolling Paul Harris Fellows and Sustaining Members. An individual who contributes US\$1,000 or more within a 12-month period (or has that sum contributed in his behalf) is designated a Paul Harris Fellow. A person who agrees to contribute \$1,000 over an unspecified period of time with a minimum first contribution of \$100 will be recognized as a Paul Harris Sustaining Member; when the contributions reach a total of \$1,000, he or she will be designated a Paul Harris Fellow.

Each person who receives this recognition is presented with a commemorative certificate. A medal and lapel pin are also given to men so recognized and a medallion on a chain and a brooch are presented to women.

Paul Harris Fellow contributions account for almost two-thirds of the Foundation's contributions. In 1980-81, there were 11,691 new Paul Harris Fellows representing total contributions of more than \$11.6 million. -R-
