MEETING OF JULY 29: Charles Hartman introduced to the club a project that germinated as an idea during his term as club president. The project is a joint one with St. John Hospital to provide free plastic surgery to children that suffer from disfigurement and are unable to obtain proper treatment in their part of the world. Ms. Sandra Zwick, St. John Deputy Administrator, related how the program began as a joint effort between Dr. Abdel Fustok, a plastic surgeon, and Raymond Khoury, the hospital's administrator and a member of our club. Dr. Fustok presented at the meeting both "before" (ghastly) and "after" (remarkable) photos of conditions which he is able to treat in this program. Our Rotary Club's involvement will be the sponsorship of the patient in providing transportation and lodging for the patient and their family. The club will also coordinate and assist in selecting and screening patients with the worldwide clubs of Rotary International. The Space Center Rotary wives group has offered to assist the club in providing hospitality for the patients and families in this worthwhile and exciting project. Al Jowid is the club's chairman for this special committee.

MEETING OF AUG. 5: George Carlisle, Business Manager of the OCISD, gave us a rapid-fire summary of the provisions of House Bill 72 ("Education Reform") and its effects on our schools. He held our close attention even into an unusual 15 minutes of overtime questions. He feels there is much that is good in the bill, that the "no pass, no play" aspect has captured the media attention at the expense of the other aspects, and that things could have been improved if more time had been (Continued on page 2.)-----

taken to get more input. The other ten provisions in the bill are: Equalization between districts, an appointed board, increased salaries with a career ladder, tutorials are required, 1 to 22 teacher/pupil ratio in K-2 with further extension in 1988, pre-kindergarten program for the disadvantaged and those with limited English proficiency, appraisal system, grading system, testing (of teachers and administrators plus exit exams beginning this year in the eleventh grade), and a discipline management plan. The bottom line is MONEY. State funds will be down while the mandates will be up. Fortunately, CCISD is in good financial condition, SO IT'S ONLY GOING TO HURT A LITTLE, FRIENDS.----And---Floyd Boze managed to condense his usual "2-minute" talk to only 5 minutes!!!!!

At the 7AM Board Meeting Tuesday August 6, the Board accepted the recommendation of the Shrimporee Committee that its primary beneficiary for this year's event be the **Children's Shelter of the Bay Area, Inc.** This new group envisions opening a Children's Shelter somewhere in the Bay Area by the spring of 1986 to provide a preventive program against the abuse and neglect of children in our community. The shelter will provide a safe place for children of parents who find themselves about to commit abuse. The children will receive respite care while their parents will receive support in handling their problem by provision of counselling, parent education, and parent support groups. All of this is with the hope of reuniting the children with their parents. We are delighted and proud to participate in getting this helpful program into reality.


MINI-EDITORIALS:
