

TOP SPACE PEOPLE WILL SPEAK HERE NEXT

It is appropriate that the next two Space Center Rotary meetings will bring us talks by two leaders in the nation's space program, Dr. Maxime A. Faget and Gerry Griffith. DON'T MISS THESE TWO PROGRAMS.

Dr. Maxime A. Faget has an imposing backgound of 35 years in the space program, including the period from 1962 to 1981, when he served as Director of Engineering and Development at NASA's Johnson Space Center, where he was responsible for supervising the design, development and proof of performance of manned spacecraft projects and related systems. He played a major role in developing the basic ideas and original design concepts that have been incorporated into every manned spacecraft the United States has flown, including the space shuttle. His space work has led to an impressive list of honors and awards. Dr Faget is now president of Space Industries, Inc., a small Houston-based company, that will construct and operate the first habitable commercial platform in space. Just last month, Space Industries, Inc. signed an agreement with NASA that will allow SII to deploy from the Space Shuttle its Industrial Space Facility, a privately owned commercial platform. SII is the first private company to sign an agreement with NASA's Space Station Office to share information that could result in a commercial facility capable of compatible operations with the space station. --A timely talk!

Corry Griffin, current Director of NASA's Johnson Space Center, is a native Texas from Athens, Texasa, who received his BS in Aeronautical Engineering from Texas A and M University. He has held key technical and managerial positions since joining NASA in 1964. For example, he was a Flight Director in the Mission Control Center at the Johnson Space Center for all of the Apollo missions. He later served as NASA's primary interface with the Congress from 1973-1975. He has also served as Deputy Director of the Dryden Flight Research Center in California and as Deputy Director of the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. He served as Vice President for Scott Science and Technology from 1981 to 1982, but returned to NASA in 1982. Here is the man who heads this major activity in our midst, an activity that appears destined for another surge of major growth.




