

PROGRAM NOTES

MEETING OF FEB. 24: This meeting program was arranged by Clay Fulcher, who introduced the speaker, Commander Jerry Heinz of the U. S. Coast Guard. Commander Heinz is the commanding officer at the Coast Guard Station, Houston. He brought along a sound-on-slide show that explained the varied mission of the Coast Guard and what it means to the local area. The show described the SAR (search and rescue) mission as their primary role in peacetime. It is, of course, the one most familiar to everyone. The Coast Guard is also active in fighting drug smuggling and immigration law violations. They maintain our lighthouses and seagoing navigation facilities. They have extensive educational programs on boating safety and even keep our northern shipping lanes open with icebreakers. We are also reminded that they are one of our armed forces, responsible for coastal defense in time of war. Commander Heinz fielded a broad range of questions concerning the local mission and what the Coast Guard is doing in the Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean. ——(Program Notes cont'd on p.2)——


Program Notes (Cont'd)

MEETING OF MARCH 3: Don Kirk introduced a program from the YMCA on physical fitness. The program manager of the Bay Area YMCA, Berry Womeldurf, told us about the local YMCA fitness programs and their fitness coordinator, Mariana Targhetta, conducted a demonstration with a weird collection of "fossil types" that she found among the club members (See photo). The local Y has an extensive program that includes lectures, testing, backache relief, stress management and aerobics. Ms Womeldurf explained that cardiovascular problems have their beginnings in our lives as much as 15 years before they actually show up. Therefore, even if we feel great today, lack of exercise, poor diet and too much stress can lay the groundwork for problems years from now. So we need to pay attention to the needs of our bodies. The program concluded with a short audience participation in a stress relief exercise.



Austria Report (Cont'd.)

We had a comfortable hotel and the city offered a variety of restaurants. I believe my favorite was the Goldener Adler (Golden Eagle) with ambience, good food, and German music (part of which I recorded during dinner). Among the other sights in Innsbruk were the Little Golden Roof, the Hofkirke (church), the museum and the palace, as well as the narrow streets with the ornate buildings from earlier times mingled with the simpler designs of recent construction.

Innsbruk provided the skiers many choices. Our athletic president Bob Wren probably was the best performer. Jim Hargrove said that the skiing was great—he only had a couple of "good" falls—and only limped a little! Some of the slopes looked to me to be well beyond "advanced", more like "impossible", but Bob Wren says they were exciting.

Innsbruk offered many side trip opportunities, including Venice (by train), Salzburg, sleigh riding, and a wine and shopping tour to the Italian border. But a special treat was the all day trip into Bavaria to the German castle "Neuschwanstein" (shown on page 1). We negotiated MANY flights of winding stairs to a meanificient set of rooms in the upper part of the castle. This followed a long, uphill walk in the snow to get to the base of the castle. But it was worth it. On the return trip we stopped in Oberammergau, the site of the familiar periodic Passion Play and a woodcarving center. especially for cookoo clocks.



Austria Report (Part 3)


