MEETING OF MARCH 24: Our guest speaker was Gean Leonard, Chief of the Galveston County Organized Crime Control Unit. Gean was introduced by Rotarian Gene Lindquist, who continues to do a great job of coming up with interesting speakers. Mr. Leonard gave essentially a "good news-bad news" presentation on the state of organized crime in our area. The bad news is that organized crime does operate in our area, especially in the trafficking of illegal drugs. The good news is that our local Organized Crime Control Unit is working effectively and their efforts are receiving the public's support to deal with the problem. Of course, we can always do better. Mr. Leonard said that he has been working in this area for 13 years and on one occasion watched a seizure of enough marijuana to fill five 18-wheelers. This is a problem that we, the public, are going to have to combat for a long time. MEETING OF MARCH 31: The club program was presented by Dr. Tom Pruett, a Rotarian from the Brazosport Club. Dr. Pruett, an optometrist, was introduced by one of our own Rotarian optometrists, Dr. Ron Hopping. Dr. Pruett's presentation covered the early activities of an eye-care program for Mexican residents living in cardboard shacks south of Juarez, Mexico. Having been one of the founding volunteers of the program, he was able to provide some very interesting slides and descriptions of the primitive working conditions under which his team had to perform examinations and surgery. His program has matured and has been adopted by Rotary International 3H program in Mexico. The team now has a fully equipped surgery van at their disposal. This program has a special meaning for our club since we are in the intitial stages of a similar international service project. Everyone involved in our program to aid deformed children from other lands was encouraged by the success that the eye care program has enjoyed. We also want to commend our own Drs. The Bulletin Committee has been authorized by the Board to proceed with the execution of the important task of raising additional funds for support of all of Space Center Rotary's worthy projects. Monthly contributions are being solicited. In return, we propose to insert an extra sheet in the Blastoff, which is published every two weeks, to carry "advertisements", or probably more accurately stated, to recognize those who have made contributions applying for that month.

We have devised a format for this insert that we believe will be of appropriate taste, that will make interesting reading by the members, and that will provide exposure for the contributors in a favorable setting. A general example of the layout is shown on an attached sheet.

In order to make this activity successful as well as practical for execution, we have adopted some policies that we believe will be necessary to govern it:

- 1. Contributions are being sought from individuals and businesses in an amount of \$50/month each. Each \$50 of contribution will be designated to apply to a specific month.
- 2. Each month, the previous month's contributors will be recognized in the insert section of the Blastoff. Each contributor for that month will be furnished a space (currently planned to be as shown on the example), which can be used for an ad or any message (in good taste, of course).
- 3. As a practical matter, copy for the spaces provided needs to be camera-ready to exact size (1" x 2") when submitted, or needs to be text that can be typed to fit by our computer.

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

Chuck Jacobson called our attention to this article in FORBES of two weeks ago **BACK TO MAIN STREET**

The business club, spurned in the Seventies for its Main Street squareness, is making a strong comeback. Rotary International, for example, passed the million-member mark last month with much help, surprisingly, from Asia. Last year 968 new Rotary clubs were formed—nearly twice the number in 1975. The total reached 22,000 workdwide 32% more than a decade earlier. An average of three new clubs joins each day, most of them in Asia—including India, Japan and Korea—where there are now 186,000 members, nearly 20% of the total. "A developing middle class and upper-middle class recognizes a need in their communities for this type of group," says Jack Giles, a Rotary spokesman. In the U.S., where the typical annual membership fee is \$100, the ranks are filling up with young professionals who want to tune in to colleagues and communities. The clubs are also attracting a growing number of older men who are staying active longer.

MEETING PHOTOS






