

Officer's Corner

For several years, a recurring issue to come up for discussion by the Board of Directors has been that of club size. Considerable debate has ensued with some saying that the Club is too big; that it has lost its intimacy; that "I don't know half of the members!".

It is true that at least one-half of the current members have been inducted in the last 5-6 years, but that is also true of my church and other organizations and is indicative of the transiency of our community. It is also true that it takes a great deal of effort to become acquainted with the new members. On the other side of the argument, it is urged that only with adequate numbers of members can a club have sufficient dedicated ones to carry out the desired service projects and make a significant contribution to the needs of the community. Perhaps this is true. It certainly seems that no matter what size the organization, a small percentage of the members do most of the work. In that case, 30% of 200 members can probably accomplish more than 30% of 100. This is some indication of the manner in which the two sides have debated the issue.

While all such arguments have some validity, none, in my opinion, get to the heart of the issue. As with all other things

that we do as Rotarians, our motivation should be service to others. The Rotary Manual of Procedure states "A Rotary club should have in its membership a representative of every recognized business or professional or institutional activity in the community...". The Classification Comittee is given the responsibility of completing a classification survey of the Club's territory prior to August 31 of each year. The results of that survey indicate that between 300 and 400 separate classifications are represented and each one suggests a potential member of this club. Those are unique classifications, not multiple, similar ones which we use extensively to allow us to have several bankers, realtors, etc. in our membership. Further, as many as two additional active members are allowed under each classification. Additionally, the classifications of members who become senior active because of age and/or service are released to allow for more members.

So when is a club too big? Form a rules standpoint, not until all classifications have been filled. When is a club too small? Again, from a rules standpoint, when there are any unfilled classifications. This suggests to me that the issue should really not be one of size, but one of numbers of members who are dedicated to the ideals of service through Rotary. From that view, a club is too big when it has too many members riding the wagon, so called "Rotarians in name only", and too few pushing or pulling it. Conversely,

a club is too small when it has not extended the priviledges of being a Rotarianto every 'qualified' person who lives or works in the club's territory and for whom there is an open classification or room for an additional active member.

In a club with a large number of members it is more difficult to adequately deal with the challenge of meeting the needs of the individual members, to keep them involved, motivated, and serving. By the same token, a large club probably has a greater ability to serve the community and the world in very significant ways. Certainly that has been true in Space Center Rotary Club.

Think about it, and the next time you hear a comment about club size or are tempted to make one yourself, consider whether the question is one of size or one of dedication. At each meeting, make an effort to sit with someone you do not know, become active in committee work, challenge yourself to meet and know the name of each member of our club this year, and be proud to be a member of the greatest Rotary club in the world. Size, whether too big or too small, may not be the problem.


