The Shrimporee provided a fine opportunity for us to have some fun together-- while we worked together, the best way to do it. Some of the Shrimporee leaders felt compelled to award prexy Terry Hesson an apron trimmed in orange and white lace appropriate to a Texas EX. #### PROGRAM NOTES: adapted from notes by Steve Bolton

Meeting of October 5: Steve Waldner introduced our speaker, Dr. Paul Pepe, Director of Emergency Medical Services, City of Houston, and Associate Professor, Baylor College of Medicine. Dr. Pepe's rapid-fire style and meaningful message held the club's attention even into overtime. His subject: Sudden Death Syndrome (ventricular fibrillation) which is the number "uno" killer in the United States. 400,000 Americans die from this every year. The syndrome results from a short-circuiting of the heart, and with the heart not circulating oxygenated blood, death can result in 4 minutes. The average age for men who suffer this is 58, with the average age for women who experience it being 64.

The key to survival in sudden death syndrome is immediacy of action. Early CPR greatly enhances the chance of survival. Dr. Pepe came to us from Seattle where very successful techniques had been worked out. Enhanced 911 service is now available in Houston, where a simple message: "we've got someone not breathing here" can be patched in 11 seconds to the nearest team equipped to respond. After widespread training of the city's firefighters in CPR, the response has been shifted from ambulances to fire engines with a considerable improvement in response time-- and with a release of ambulances to other emergency services for which they are the only appropriate response. Another important link in the chain of survival is the ability to administer electrical shock to reverse the fibrillation that stopped the heart's pumping action. The fire engines are now equipped to do this. They are even now equipped with a system that can automatically determine when and if a shock is needed and tell the operator. Dr. Pepe demonstrated one of these units and the fact that no training is needed to operate it.

His advice: If you want to survive sudden death syndrome, get your closest family and friends to learn CPR. They will save you!

# Now is the time and here is the good word on the ROTARY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Foundation has two scholarship programs for college students to study in any country where Rotary has a presence. The first is for college students who are in their freshman year and is designated the Under The students selected will Graduate Scholarship. attend a college in the country of their choice at the beginning of their junior year in college. Foundation has the final decision on the country the student will study in but normally the student's choice will be honored. The second scholarship is the Graduate Scholarship. The students will be chosen in their junior year in college and will attend the college of their or the Foundation's choice in the fall following their graduation. Under both programs the student must be able to write, read and speak the language of the country of their study. The candidate can not be a relative of a Rotarian.

Space Center Rotary Club has been very successful in this program principally because of our excellent local candidates. Our selection process is very simple. We request the senior counselors at the high schools to send us a list of students that qualify for the two scholarship programs. We send them an application for the awards and during the Christmas break we interview them. Our committee evaluates the students as to who we consider will be the best ambassador of good will for Rotary, which is the Foundation's purpose. The students must have good academic records so they will not embarrass Rotary but this is not a scholarship award.

If you know a student that qualifies and would be interested in this program, please give us their name and address and we will invite them to participate.

# Exemption from attendance requirement:

A member's absence shall be excused if he or she is a senior active member and (i) has been a member of one or more Rotary clubs for an aggregate of twenty (20) years or more and has reached the age of 65 years, or (ii) has been a member of one or more Rotary clubs for an aggregate of fifteen (15) years or more and has reached the age of 70 years.

However, to take advantage of this provision of the Rotary Club Constitution, the member must notify the club secretary in writing of his or her desire to be excused from attendance. If approved by the board of directors, the members absences shall not be computed in the club's attendance records, but if desired by the member, his or her attendance may be An important computed. consideration in this election is the member's desire or not to accumulate years of perfect attendance.
