### HOW DID I GET HERE

It was about ten years ago that my good friend Jim McDonald asked me to join him at a Space Center Rotary luncheon at the Holiday Inn. The food was OK, the fellowship promising and the speaker entertaining. A short while later Jim asked me if I was interested in joining Rotary. I was - and I was soon inducted into the Space Center Rotary Club. But was I a Rotarian??

We did not have a Red Badge program at that time. I came to lunch on Mondays, sat with a group of people I did not know, and listened to conversations that did not include me. I began to wonder why I ever agreed to join Rotary.

It was at Shrimporee that I fully experienced the deepest meaning of being a Rotarian and the excitement of fellowship which is at the heart of it. David Cantu and I were put on the fish fry committee. We cooked fish all day in those old, small oil fryers. I had hot oil burns all over my hands, arms and chest. That night I thought that I would never want to see another fish again. But, I was aware that I had a terrific time and the fellowship was great. After that, people began to call me by name. I was asked to join several committees and to head an ad hoc committee.

Once I became active I began to connect names with faces. The more active I became, the fore I found to do, the more I was asked to do, and I relished it. Whenever I needed guidance, my good friend and sponsor, Jim McDonald was there.

After serving on several committees I was asked to chair committees. I profoundly liked Rotary and I especially valued the friendships that developed. The atmosphere was different.

It was not like the "real world" of stress and competition. We were all there to work together and serve. To serve equally without notice of position or public recognition. I found myself looking for community programs I could help develop, and success was a great satisfying reward.

I began attending, whenever possible, all of the Club Assemblies, District Assemblies, and District conventions. I was asked to work on District Committees. The more of these meetings I attended the greater my circle of friends became.

In 1988 I was asked to have my name placed on a ballot for a position on the Board of directors. I was told that my name would be one of ten on a ballot from which three directors would be elected by the club members. I tried to refuse. I was 'terrified'. I did not think that I knew enough about Rotary and there were so many more knowledgeable members in the club.

I finally agreed, thinking that there was no chance that I would be one of the three to be picked out of ten. You guessed it - I was.

I truly enjoyed being a Director and being in on the discussions and mechanics that moved the club. Some of the decisions that had to be made were difficult, but I could depend on the support and the wisdom of past presidents and the assistance and guidance of fellow Rotarians who readily shared their opinions with me. And yesmy friend and sponsor Jim McDonald was always there.

And then one day I received a request to be put on the ballot for the position of Sergeant-at-Arms. I felt honored. Just the idea of being considered was a great thrill.

WELL, HERE I AM. - President of the Space Center Rotary Club, the most active and the most respected Rotary club in District 5890. I confess that I feel uncomfortable and ill at ease. I am still not sure of what is going to happen. It is scary being President of a large volunteer service club. I know that I will need all the support I can get from all the members of Space Center Rotary. For it is the members who

are the life blood of the club and who will direct it's course.

Working together - and with the help of GOD we will have a successful and fun year.

And O YES - Jim McDonald, thanks for inviting me to lunch.

#### **TURNING POINT**

In our 7/12 meeting Diane Savage,
of Bay Area Turning Point,
brought us up to date on the
organizations activities.

Turning Point provides counseling & intervention to local women who are victims in assault cases or are victims of family violence. Turning point works closely with local police and community organizations.

Recently the turning point has acquired property in Webster to provide a "bed" for these victims.

The property has two existing houses. The smaller house is being renovated and is in need of a real shower. The larger house is to be torn down to make way for a new facility.

When phase I is completed it will house 16 people. The completion of phase II will allow the facility to hold a total of 35 people.

Thirty five cases of family violence are reported each month. The shelter provides a safe place to recover and decreases the victims trauma by being able to handle it at a local level.

The center is expected to open in January 1994. It will need staffing and is expected to serve 6000 meals a year.




