

Rotary Foreign Exchange - Outbound Orientation Camp by Alan Wylie

Last week (June 1-6) we had our week long orientation camp in Livingston, Texas for 37 long term American outbound students, from 6 districts in Texas and one district in Oklahoma and one district in Mississippi ...The students bonded closely together, learned much about Rotary, and learned a lot in preparation for their year abroad. The camp theme was: "IF IT IS TO BE, IT'S UP TO MEL"...
