


Living a Grateful Life

Why not use this Thanksgiving Day as the first step toward becoming a more grateful family? Giving thanks for one's blessings on this holiday is traditional. Feeling grateful every day is an attitude and a way of experiencing life. If you want to cultivate gratitude as a family value, the following questions can help you make giving thanks an integral, daily part of your lives.

How can we give thanks every day? Focus on creating both individual and family rituals. Keep "gratitude journals"; set aside time for family prayer; try to be more physically affectionate with one another; make an effort to express your appreciation and encouragement. Giving your thanks daily establishes gratitude as a priority in your family.

What do we take for granted that we might express thanks for every day? We all need to open our eyes and appreciate our daily gifts: food, shelter, clothing, good health, friendship, the beauty of nature, and the kindness of others. Talking about ways to increase our awareness of these daily blessings is productive.

Is doing for others a way of expressing gratitude? Discuss how helping others is gratitude in action. You might not only prepare and/or help serve a holiday meal at a homeless shelter, but also talk about how your family can make a commitment of time and service to this shelter on a regular basis. Expressing thanks by actively helping others in an ongoing way can be one of your family's "gratitude goals."

What attributes do you possess that you are thankful for? This self-examination encourages self-gratitude, helping us pause to appreciate our skills, talents, and personality traits. If we've lost sight of our special gifts, this gives family members an opportunity to point them out to us: "You are the best listener." "You always manage to cheer us up when we're down." "You can fix anything that's broken."

Who has treated you with kindness and generosity, and how would you like to thank that person? Gratitude can take many forms – a homemade gift, a thank-you card, a phone call, a spontaneous favor. Remembering those who have made us feel special and valued encourages us to become more aware and appreciative of human kindness. You might discuss ways to show your gratitude by passing on a person's kindness through your own acts of generosity.

Teaching your children by example how to make their gratitude known is at the core of teaching them how to appreciate and celebrate the abundance in their lives. These are lessons learned throughout a lifetime, not merely discussions we have at Thanksgiving dinner.

Vocational Service Chair person: Adena Losten

This committee is required to receive nominations evaluating and selecting the Outstanding Business Person in our area with the possibility of gaining new members. As Rotarians, we strongly believe that excellence in a chosen profession of vocation along with the Four Way Test is evident in daily life deserves a "Rotary Recognition." The VEA is for someone in our community that is an "Outstanding Business Person" and a community leader with notable achievements who has not yet become a Rotary member. The VEA will include a \$500 scholarship that will be giving to San Jacinto Community College in the name of the VEA recipient. The VEA nomination will be sent to the district level for further consideration for the District Award.

Career Development at Clear View High School Chairperson: Claire Taylor

This committee will reward outstanding Clear View students who have met requirements for VIP (Vocational Internship Program) and to open career doors for those same students. Also, this committee will provide positive experiences and exposure to Rotarians and the businesses in our area. The goal of this committee is to demonstrate to the Clear View student body through the positive experiences and opportunities of the VIP students that hard work and determination to complete goals provides further opportunities and rewards.

Excellence in Education Chairperson: Joan Skellenger The goal of this committee is to promote Rotary as an organization that recognizes and rewards excellence in education in the vocation of teaching the children of our community. This committee will honor teachers in the Clear Creek ISD who have achieved excellence in education by granting four Excellence in Education Awards of \$300 each and two \$1000 Teacher of the Year Awards to an Elementary and Secondary education teacher. Other awards will include certificates, personal plaques, and individual recognition at a Rotary luncheon presentation. There will be a perpetual plaque on display at the CCISD Administration Building to recognize the Teachers of the Year.

Excellence in Law Enforcement Chairperson: Bill Farries

The goal of this committee is to recognize the Law enforcement officers that work in the Bay Area community. Yearly, this committee will award five officers with the Law Enforcement Distinguished Service Award. There will be one "Officer of the Year." A Rotary Luncheon presentation will recognize the officers with certificates and cash awards. A perpetual Plaque in the Harris County Courthouse, Clear Lake Annex will be maintained to recognize the "Officer of the Year."




Take care my wonderful friends, God bless you for being here for me. Love to all, Claire

Behind the Scenes at Our Favorite Parade

In the failing light of a frigid Thanksgiving Eve, 180 members of a Florida high-school band huddle in the wind outside their Newark, N.J., hotel. Numb fingers in thin black gloves push reluctant instruments keys. Lips stick to trombones like kids' tongues on cold metal fences.



"I know this isn't what we're used to," bellow Jose Lopez, director of the Port Charlotte High School Band. "But when are we gonna get another chance to play in an event this big? Let's give it all we've got!" Across the Hudson River, on Manhattan's Upper West Side, other performers are being nudged awake after a year-long sleep. One rumpled 78-foot form spreads out onto a tarp. Helium hoses are inserted in its inflation sleeves and a form takes shape. "It's Spider-Man!" squeals a young-ster. Nearby, The Cat in the Hat's 18-foot top hat sways in the breeze. Kids and parents cheer. In midtown Manhattan, a tall, gray-haired woman addresses the crowd in what looks like a military briefing room. "Everyone's got to be on their toes," jean McFaddin orders. "We can't afford foul-ups." If it all resembles a kind of D-Day-well, the comparison is apt. A vast army of Macy's volunteers has descended on New York to produce one of America's most beloved traditions: Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

The televised spectacle is watch by more than 60 million people. But it's what goes on behind the scenes--the energy, dedication and clockwork precision--that makes it truly one of the country's enduring wonders.

Ups and Downs. It all started in 1924, the year that Macy's managers and employees--many of them European immigrants who missed their homeland harvest festivals--decided to organize a Thanksgiving Day Parade. The procession included a huge turkey float, bands, clowns, cowboys, giants, even lions and bears snarling at the crowds. It was a rousing success, and the event was repeated. But to spare kids' nerves, organizers replaced the live animals in 1927 with air-filled balloons: Felix the Cat, a dragon, an elephant and a toy soldier.

The next year, the balloons were filled with helium and released for a grand finale. They rocketed above the towering skyscrapers-and exploded. No one took into account that helium expands in thinning atmosphere. In 1929, the balloons got safety valves and
were equipped with tickets offering Macy's merchandise to the finder. The glitter of prizes proved too much. In one instance, two
tugboats on New York's East River steamed toward a downed dachshund balloon and, between them, tore the poor dog to pieces.

The event has had its share of ups and downs. During World War II, rubber from the balloons was donated to the war effort, and the parade was canceled from 1942 to 1944--the only interruption in 72 years. (Balloons today are made of urethane-coated nylon, which is lighter than rubber and just as strong.) In 1957, Popeye collected so much rain in the cap

atop his 14-foot head that he periodically careened off-balance, dumping gallons of water on spectators. In 1958, there was a helium shortage, so the behemoths were filled with air and carted down the parade route dangling from construction cranes.

The wildly inventive balloons and floats come to life on the drawing board of Manfred Bass, 61, who for the past 36 years has been the parade's lead designer. He works with a team of Macy's artists, machinists, carpenters, animators, electricians and mold makers.

In Manny's office are racks of drawings and dozens of clay models of balloons past and present.

"Air stability is important," he explains. "We have to consider whether a balloon is a horizontal flier or a vertical flier." The angle of flight will determine which balloon chamber gets filled with helium, for lift, and which gets plain, old air, for stability.

Big Bird, from "Sesame Street," has a helium-filled head that keeps him upright over his heavier, air-filled feet. Spider-Man—at 78 feet the parade's longest balloon-flies horizontally at six stories above the crowds. His 8300 cubic feet of helium is distributed in ten separate airtight compartments along his back, which his underside is filled with air.
