


## President's Day History of the Holiday



The original version of the holiday was in commemoration of George Washington's birthday in 1796 (the last full year of his presidency). Washington, according to the calendar that has been used since at least the mid-18th century, was born on February 22, 1732. According to the old style calendar in use back then, however, he was born on February 11. At least in 1796, many Americans celebrated his birthday on the 22nd while others marked the occasion on the 11th instead.



By the early 19th century, Washington's Birthday had taken firm root in the American experience as a bona fide national holiday. Its traditions included Birthnight Balls in various regions, speeches and receptions given by prominent public figures, and a lot of revelry in taverns throughout the land. Then along came Abraham Lincoln, another revered president and fellow February baby (born on the 12th of the month). The first formal observance of his birthday took place in 1865, the year after his assassination, when both houses of Congress gathered for a memorial address. While Lincoln's Birthday did not become a federal holiday like George Washington's, it did become a legal holiday in several states.

In 1968, legislation (HR 15951) was enacted that affected several federal holidays. One of these was Washington's Birthday, the observation of which was shifted to the third Monday in February each year whether or not it fell on the 22nd. This act, which took effect in 1971, was designed to simplify the yearly calendar of holidays and give federal employees some standard three-day weekends in the process.

Apparently, while the holiday in February is still officially known as Washington's Birthday (at least according to the Office of Personnel Management), it has become popularly (and, perhaps in some cases at the state level, legally) known as "President's Day." This has made the third Monday in February a day for honoring both Washington and Lincoln, as well as all the other men who have served as president.



#### TOMMY HOLLOWAY, TO RECEIVE

#### 2001 ROTARY NATIONAL AWARD FOR SPACE ACHIEVEMENT (RNASA)

#### NATIONAL SPACE TROPHY

Officials with the Rotary National Award for Space Achievement Foundation announced today that Tommy Holloway, manager of the International Space Station (ISS) program for NASA, will be honored with the 2001 Rotary National Award for Space Achievement for his distinguished contributions to the U.S. space program. Holloway will receive this award at the 14<sup>th</sup> annual awards banquet, to be held on March 2, 2001 at Space Center Houston, the official visitors center for NASA Johnson Space Center.

As a veteran engineer, expert flight planner, and a senior manager, Holloway has made major contributions to all of NASA's human space flight programs, including Mercury, Gemini, Apollo, Skylab, Space Shuttle and International Space Station. He joined the NASA-Johnson Space Center in 1963 as a flight planner, developing astronaut procedures and timelines. Throughout his 37-year-career, he has held key management positions such as Chief Flight Director, Director of Mission Operations, as well as both Assistant Director and Manager of the Space Shuttle Program, overseeing the daily operations of the program. These included shuttle hardware acquisitions, vehicle processing for launch, flight preparation, astronaut training and in-flight operations.

One of his many significant career achievements occurred in 1970 during Apollo 13, in which an onboard explosion almost led to the demise of the famous mission. Responding to the immediate need to reconfigure procedures based on the spacecraft's critically eroded systems capabilities, Holloway developed, tested and implemented an entirely new set of flight procedures that led to the safe return of the Apollo 13 crew and spacecraft.

In 1994, Holloway was named as Director of the Phase One Program, the collaboration of the United States and Russia to begin developing elements of the future International Space Station (ISS). This ultimately led to his current position as Manager of the ISS program, where he is responsible for the overall management, development, integration and operation of the International Space Station.

"For the last 37 years, Tommy Holloway has made significant contributions to the U.S. space program," said Brewster Shaw, Vice President and General Manager International Space Station of The Boeing Company. "His undying commitment to excellence has earned him a reputation for being a true pioneer in the quest to explore the realm of space."

The Rotary National Award for Space Achievement is presented annually to a United States citizen who has made a preeminent contribution to the advancement of America's space program. The principal award, The National Space Trophy, is a sevenfoot-tall, conical lead crystal that weighs 500 pounds and is permanently displayed at Space Center Houston. It is bestowed for important accomplishments in a space-related field such as research and development, operations management, program administration or legislation. Aerospace corporations, government agencies, professional organizations and individuals submit nominations for this prestigious award. Finalists are voted on by the Foundation's National Board of Advisors.

The Rotary National Award for Space Achievement Foundation is a non-profit organization established in 1985 by the Space Center Rotary Club of Houston. The Foundation was established to recognize outstanding individual achievement in space and to create greater public awareness of space exploration.
