

Rotary District 5890 Presents Vocational Excellence Award to Jay Honeycutt

May 2001 - Rotary District 5890 (greater Houston area) "Outstanding Business Person" of the year was presented at the annual Rotary District Assembly held at the University of Houston Hilton recently. District Governor Charlie Clemmons and District Vocational Excellence Award (VEA) Chair Sheila Self presented Jay F. Honeycutt the prestigious "Outstanding Business Person" award. Over 500 Rotarians attended this year's District Assembly.

Excellence in a chosen profession or vocation, along with the Four Way Test evident in our daily life, deserves "a Rotary Recognition" and is presented annually to a non-Rotarian. Rotary recognizes the accomplishments and contributions of our outstanding business leaders. Leaders that perpetuate and inspire the values of entrepreneurial spirit, personal integrity, and community leadership - who honor their vocation and community through excellence in their efforts to truly make a difference to our future. This award also achieves to gain new contributing members to local Rotary clubs and provides more knowledge about Rotary and vocational scholarships.

The district committee puts a lot of thought and consideration into their evaluation of the nominees. The committee includes: John Chimenti, Bob Ellis, Bob Franklin, Bill Geissler, Bill Haglund, Steve Harris, Rhonda Kennedy, John Painter, Joe Shirley, Andy Smallwood, Scott Stephens, Tom Swanson, Ann Wright, and Ron Zilliox.

Honeycutt received "Outstanding Business Person" by the Rotary Club of Space Center prior to his nomination being submitted to the Rotary District 5890 VEA Committee along with other award recipients from some of the other 53 clubs in the district. Honeycutt received an engraved cut glass award and a vocational scholarship award in his name and Rotary's to help students at local colleges. Honeycutt's wife Peggy, Ken Reightler, Vice President of Lockheed Martin Space Operations-Science Engineering Analysis and Test Operation, Ron Meder, Director of Communications for Lockheed Martin Space Operations and Linda Evett, Assistant to the President of Lockheed Martin Space Operations, Charlie Clemmons announced Mr. Honeycutt as an Honorary Rotarian.

Honeycutt is President of Lockheed Martin Space Operations and has been a significant contributor to the nation's space exploration effort both as a high-ranking civil servant for NASA and as an industry leader representing one of the largest aerospace companies in the world. In his present position, he leads more than 2,500 employees in the Clear Lake Area, who play an integral role in support of NASA's human space flight and scientific exploration programs. In addition, Jay is a member of the Advisory Board of United Space Alliance, a joint venture owned equally by Lockheed Martin and Boeing. Prior to joining Lockheed Martin in 1997, he held several key positions with NASA before retiring as Director of the John Kennedy Space Center. During his tenure as Director, the Kennedy Space Center team achieved major process refinements and system improvements that resulted in enhanced safety features, reductions in labor-hour and processing turnaround times, and cost savings.

Prior to his appointment as Director, Honeycutt served as Director of Shuttle Management and Operations for Kennedy Space Center. He began his government career at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama, as an engineer in 1960. He then transferred to the Johnson Space Center in 1966, where he held positions of increasing responsibility in the Apollo and Space Shuttle programs. In the period following the Challenger accident, he coordinated the Presidential Commission and congressional activities that were conducted to investigate the tragedy. Mr. Honeycutt is an elected Fellow of the American Astronautical Society for his "direct and significant contributions to the field of astronautics".

Of particular note, Honeycutt introduced the Technology Outreach Program (TOP) to Texas, a program that provides no cost solutions to technical problems being experienced by small companies, resulting in more jobs, financial stability, and better products. TOP is designed to speed the transfer of space technology into the private sector - a free service! He currently chairs JSC's Contractor Safety Forum and served as chairman of the 2000 U.S. Savings Bond Drive for the Greater Houston, Texas Area.

Honeycutt is an active member of the Clear Lake and greater Houston communities and he encourages Lockheed Martin's 2,500 employees to volunteer their time in support of local schools and a number of charitable causes that benefit many citizens in the community. Leading by example, he is a board member of the International Brain Injury Foundation, Houston Technology Center, University of Houston-Clear Lake Development and Advisory Council, University of Houston Engineering Leadership Board, Space Center Houston, Texas Space Leadership Council, the International Space University and the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.

The Rotary District 5890 Assembly offers motivation, inspiration, Rotary information and new ideas for club officers, leaders, directors and key committee chairpersons. Another important feature of the District Assembly is a review by the incoming Governor Dennis Adams, of the program, theme, and the year's emphasis from the new Rotary International President, Rick King. District goals and objectives are described and plans are developed for implementation. The assembly provides club officers and directors appropriate instructions for the tasks that they will assume. Plans are being made now to *Jazz It Up* at the District Conference in New Orleans next year.


