DISTRICT CORNER

The District has been approached by The Brookwood Community to partner with them in a very unique vocational program, to underwrite their Poinsettia Crop. As one of their major business enterprises, every year Brookwood citizens grow and sell Poinsettias. This year they will plant more than 40,000 Poinsettias. Every Rotary dollar invested will in this project will result in a 5-fold for Brookwood.

I know that Clubs struggle every year in trying to find a vocational project in order to obtain their Presidential Citation, and this would be great project to meet this category of service. There are three ways in which a Club and/or its members can participate. First, a Club or individual can make an outright donation. The Galleria Area Club has already stepped up and made an outright donation. Second, Clubs or individuals can purchase the Poinsettias at the wholesale price and sell them as a fundraiser and donate the proceeds from the sales back to the Brookwood Community. The third method is for individuals or Clubs to buy Poinsettias for \$15.00 each.

Additionally, your Club can participate in a "hands on" service project. On August 18, 2009, the citizens will be planting this year's crop. They are inviting the Rotary Clubs of our District to come out to Brookwood and help plant. Additionally, when the Poinsettias are ready to be shipped, District Rotarians are invited to come help prepare them for shipping.

Honduras is the third poorest country in the Western Hemisphere and is currently undergoing politically motivated sanctions that are hurting the already needy population. This proposal is aimed at delivering 1,000,000 servings of rice and beans to the desperately needy people in the Tegucigalpa, Honduras thru a joint effort of Rotary District 5890, Rotary clubs of Tegucigalpa, the Rotary districts/clubs in Texas, and Hunger Plus. RI President John Kenney and the Rotary Action Group (RAG) on Hunger and Malnutrition Have clearly identified Hunger as major world problem and a priority for Rotary. This project will help the needy in Honduras and serve as a model for similar projects in other needy areas. Click on story heading for more detail information.

Clubs and Districts in Texas and Honduras will jointly raise local funds and pool their resources. Hunger Plus will act as facilitator for the project. Funds will be used for parching 44,000# of beans and 44,000# of rice. They will be shipped to Tegucigalpa, Honduras and be bagged in 5# bags with the Rotary and Hunger Plus logos printed on the bags. The Club Ritario de Tegucigalpa will be the lead in all in country activities. Needy areas to be served will be identified by the 7 Rotary clubs in Tegucigalpa areas. On one day all the clubs will go out and distribute the food to the needy. Press and TV coverage will highlight Rotary and the effort to help the needy. Rotary leadership is encouraged to participate in the distribution.

Let's take on the challenge to feed 1,000,000 meals to those in extreme poverty in Honduras. The meals are less that \$.04 per meal. If a club or individual decides to help then:

\$10 = 250 meals

\$20 = 500 meals

\$30 = 750 meals

\$40 = 1000 meals

\$50 = 1250 meals

\$100 = 2500 meals

\$200 = 5000 meals

\$300 = 7500 meals

\$400 = 10,000 meals

District Governor Edward A. Charlesworth 2009 - 2010



District Governor Ed Charlesworth is a licensed Clinical Psychologist in private practice with his wife, Robin, in northwest Houston. After earning a doctorate in clinical psychology from the University of Houston in 1980, he completed his internship and post-doctoral fellowship programs at Baylor College of Medicine. He has been the Director of Willowbrook Psychological Associates since 1982. He is the author or co-author of several books, including Stress Management: A Comprehensive Guide to Wellness and Mind Over Money. In 2005, Ballantine Publishing issued a completely updated and revised 20th anniversary edition of his book, Stress Management: A Comprehensive Guide to Wellness, dedicated to Rotary International and introducing coping tools related to service and meaningful pursuits.

His professional memberships have included the American Psychological Association, Texas Psychological Association, Houston Psychological Association (past member of the Board of Directors), the Biofeedback Society of Harris County (past president), Biofeedback Society of Texas (past member of the Board of Directors), and the American Association of Psychophysiology and Biofeedback.

Ed is a strong believer in civic activities as a way of giving back to his community. He is a Charter Member of the Rotary Club of Willowbrook (1984) and a Past President (1988-89). He has served as Community Service Chair, Club Service Chair, Membership Chair, Newsletter Editor and GSE coordinator. He was also honored as club Rotarian of the Year.

In District 5890, he has also served various positions, including District Conference Committee Chair, Group Study Exchange (GSE) Chair, District Mediation Chair, Friendship Exchange Committee Chair, Rotary Youth Exchange Committee, Disaster Relief Committee, and Rotary Alumni Foundation Chair. He was GSE Team Leader to Romania in 2000. Ed and Robin have hosted many Youth Exchange students and GSE team members through the years. Ed was a crew leader during the Jimmy Carter Work Week, during which 100 Habitat for Humanity homes were built. He has also served as Sergeant-at-Arms at PETS and Zone Institutes.

In addition, Ed is a Past President of the American Heart Association. He has received several citizenship commendations from the Houston Chief of Police for his participation with the Houston Police Bicycle Relay Team to raise money for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. Robin has assisted the team by arranging home hosting with Rotarians across the U.S.A. and Canada for the bicycle teams.

Ed and Robin have been married for thirty-five years. They have two daughters: Brittany (age 25), who now lives in San Antonio and is a sales manager for Marriott Corporation; and Allison (age 20), who attends Texas Tech University. Ed met Robin at the University of Houston in an advanced level psychology course entitled "The Psychology of Emotions and Motivations". Robin holds a Masters Degree in Psychology and works with Ed in the private practice. Robin, also a Past President of Willowbrook Rotary (1998-99), served as District Literacy Chair for ten years. She has also served as Auction Chair for the premier fundraiser (2008) of the Pearl Fincher Museum of Fine Arts.

Both Ed and Robin enjoy traveling, wine-tasting, bicycling long distances on recumbent bikes, and sailing. Ed runs marathons and Robin walks half-marathons. Ed treks to Colorado annually for cross-country skiing. They hope to spend summers in Colorado after his year as Governor.
