PROJECT FREE ENTERPRISE

PURPOSE AND GOALS

The Rotary spirit of international cooperation has motivated development of this seminar to share free enterprise ideas, experience, and practical advice with the newly emerging free economies of the 1990's. This seminar presents the principles of a free market and follows with a practical step by step road map for developing your own business enterprise.

Presentations will be made by practicing, successful business people using audio visual material developed from authoritative business, academic and government sources.

The seminars will be conducted in English.

The seminar structure will allow for extensive question and answer interaction after each speaker.

The first 1 1/2 days will be formal presentations with slides and lectures followed by discussions.

The second day will have workshops in the afternoon. Smaller groups will be created with each speaker able to discuss in detail his main topic, or answer your questions and concerns. The people attending the workshops can go to any speaker they want to spend time with.

These speakers were interviewed and selected for their abilities and none of them are here to promote themselves or do business. Their mission is to share their experience in a free enterprise economy in the hope that the world will be a better place for us all.

This is the second Rotary Information Team of free enterprise speakers that Rotary International has ever had. It is the dream of the Rotarians in Houston that this idea will be adopted by other Rotary Districts around the world - thereby sharing principles and experience with emerging economies and other third world countries. They call this a Rotary Information Team. It's seminar topic is free enterprise but other Information Teams might speak on different topics - such as environment, agriculture or public health.

The fees paid to attend this seminar are low, and designed merely to cover the local expenses of putting on this seminar and hosting the speakers. The speakers paid their own way to travel here, and the cost of their presentation, by fundraising in Houston. They speak for free. They stay in Rotary sponsored homes.

Your local Rotary club is comprised of outstanding leaders and business people in your community and this seminar is just one small service they provide in an attempt to improve the community for everyone.

PURPOSE OF THE CASE STUDY

To facilitate illustration of the economic, business, and management principles using a possibly real enterprise.

To provide an example of the different components of a business enterprise and illustrate how they relate to each other.

To facilitate questions, answers and discussion of principles presented by providing a framework of organization, products, services and management concepts and definitions.

OVERVIEW OF THE NEW HORIZONS COMPANY

New Horizons is in the manufacturing business. It began as a small retail store and a machine shop which manufactured the products it sold. It expanded into a larger manufacturing plant which made additional products, with a warehouse to ship its goods elsewhere.

Its owner, Lech Kowalski, used to work for his uncle's business, "Proven Products." Proven Products manufactured and sold wooden nesting dolls and painted boxes. When his uncle decided to retire, Lech bought Proven Products primarily for the potential of its woodworking equipment and formed his own business, "New Horizons."

New Horizons continued manufacturing wooden nesting dolls and boxes, and then expanded into making wooden bird houses for export to the United States.

The company leased certain metalworking machines to try making metal bird houses for export to the U.S. This added new machinists to do metal manufacturing, and allowed the company to confidently bid on a contract to make decorative metal containers for bakery goods distributed throughout Poland. To meet production goals the company purchased additional metal manufacturing equipment and added several more employees. In addition, Mr. Kowalski experimented with producing an electric accent lamp.

Unlike his uncle, who was pretty much a craftsman and a shopkeeper, Mr. Kowalski became an entrepreneur; a business man who looks for opportunity and profits. A man who uses one of the most basic principles of free enterprise - Find a need, and fill it.






Organize For Success



Dr. David Taylor is the team leader, and the district director for Project Free Enterprise.

Dr. Taylor is a children's dentist who has been very active in Rotary for over ten years. He tends to get new projects started.

For example, his Rotary club now selects the Teacher of the year with a \$1,000 award for Excellence in Education. He initiated a drug awareness project for school children which has expanded into a Houston city wide essay contest with about 45,000 students participating. He started most of Houston's youth exchange contacts with as many as 15 countries - including Hungary, East Germany and the Soviet Union before the wall came down. The idea for this free enterprise seminar was a spin-off from his youth exchange activity.

He is single. The father of four young adult children. He is a native of Oklahoma. His experience in journalism has helped with this project - he was a newspaper sports writer for seven years.

He founded the Houston Society of Dentistry for Children in 1973, and became president of both the Texas Academy of Pediatric Dentists and the Texas Society of Dentistry for Children. He owns his own dental office with nine dental chairs, from which he has derived his small business experience.

He attributes his international interests to winning the History and Social Studies award for his high school and has always read and traveled as much as he can.




