"Many oficers were nominated from the police forces associated with the Clear Lake/Bay Area," Dr. Taylor said. "Our committee reviewed resumes and asked questions of the nominees and then made the difficult choice of the five."

According to Taylor the club launched the project to draw attention to law enforcement and recognize the role it performs.

"In doing so, we hope to convey the sentiment that we value what police officers do for our community and appreciate their professional standards," he said. "The club was not looking for heroes or headline-getters. Instead, it stressed professionalism, effectiveness, community involvement and valor."
