Deputy Nathan Douglas' major duties include Law Enforcement Patrol Officer, Criminal Law Enforcement, and Traffic Control. He has been serving in law enforcement for 8 years, all with the same agency. In addition to high school, and a degree in Criminal Justice, he has had training and advanced education in Intermediate Emergency Medical Technician, 1992; Intermediate Peace Officer Certification, 1996; Advanced Traffic Investigation, 1998; and Hazardous Materials Community Services Technician, 1998. include numerous volunteer programs, Bayside Little League and Nasa Area Youth Soccer, member of the CLEMC Emergency Medial Technician, works with the fire department, and is dedicated to his family. His letter of recommendation and nomination was submitted by Lt. Michael J. O'Brien, listing his many involvements in capturing burglary suspects, contributions in recovering stolen vehicles and properties, acting as a liason with chemical plants in dealing with hazardous materials, and his service as a Technician geared toward Emergency Disaster Response.

Officer Steven King's major duties include Municipal Police Patrol Officer for the cities of El Lago and Taylor Lake Village, Juvenile Officer, and Marine Safety Officer. He has been serving in law enforcement for 22 years, 18 years with his present agency. In addition to high school, he has training and advanced education in Peace Officer Certification, 1993; Child Abuse/Neglect, 1994; Shaken Baby Syndrome training, 1997, and Missing/Abduction Children training, 1998. Officer King's letter of recommendation and nomination was submitted by Chief Tom Savage, commending his high ideals of a professional, involvement in church and his children, community spirit and affairs. He is adulated for the saving of a fellow officer, on account of a lake front confrontation. Officer King spent time as an Industrial Safety Officer and at one time worked part time as an officer while maintaining another job. He is now a full time officer.

Deputy Sean Kitchens' major duties include County Precinct 8 Law Enforcement Patrol Officer, Officer dispatcher, and Highway Patrol Officer. Deputy Kitchens' letter recommendation and nomination was submitted by his Supervisor, Constable Bill Bailey, recounting a kidnapping which took place in the 3100 block of Nasa Road 1. While Deputy Kitchens took the original call, he was off-duty when he alertly spotted the vehicle, and with back-up assistance was able to capture the suspect. Deputy Kitchens' keen sense of observation and perseverance in locating the vehicle played a major part in the apprehension of the kidnapping suspect.
