Graduation takes place over a four-day period:


- Parade of classes (many alumni return for the parade and reunion)

- Baccalaureate (student organized presentation of awards featuring speaker Bill Clinton held in back of Nassau Hall)


- Graduation (formal cap and gown ceremony held in front of Nassau Hall)

PRINCETON UNIVERSITY




Princeton has the look of an lvy League college. Here Vivian is standing in front of one of the dorms

Thomas received a car as a graduation gift







Another dorm. My son's room the first half of his junior year was at the top of the tower - that would be the fifth floor or a lot of stairs if you were to forget a book in your room

One very proud Mom. As a college professor herself, she places a high value on a good education




Each class plants an ivy plant around the base of Nassau Hall, which is one legend for the origin of the term "Ivy League"

ON TO COPENHAGEN



The convention center is located out by the airport. The facility was designed to handle multiple, simultaneous events, so getting people to the right places required lots of guidance. Here are two local **Rotarians serving** as Sgt-at-Arms



With the convention center at the airport and the hotels downtown, a system of bus routes was used to move people back-an-forth. These two controlled the staging of buses and could model as Vikings



A fixture of every RI convention is the RI shop for all things Rotary. People came from around the world, although most attendees were European

The main square is dominated by City Hall on the right and the Palace Hotel among other commercial buildings




One of the four royal mansions is to the left of the stately Marble Church that surround the 18th Century square

The economy used to be dominated by trade and fishing


The new economy has transitioned to post-industrial and is strongly supported by North Sea oil

Tradition lives on in Denmark




Many people commute by bicycle, there are even special lanes and special traffic signals just for cyclists




We stayed at the King Frederick Hotel, a comfortable and elegant old-world space



The sun came out during our visit and the Danes took advantage of the break from dreary weather




Europeans used to look down on the US because of racial issues, they down have their own issues concerning diversity




On an excursion to Humlebaek, Vivian finds her dream house that overlooks the sound between Denmark and Sweden




Traditional ways of living can be found outside of the city, this house is covered by a thatch roof
