United Way, Rotary Club of Space Center and Armand Bayou Nature Center Partner to Improve Discovery Loop

With an investment from the United Way of the Texas Gulf Coast, the Rotary Club of Space Center and Armand Bayou Nature Center (ABNC) are partnering to improve access to the Discovery Loop outdoor environmental education classroom at ABNC. The United Way awarded ABNC a Community Building Grant which will be used toward the materials and equipment needed to resurface a portion of the Discovery Loop. United Way Community Building Grants provide a one-time, short-term funding to nonprofit civic and neighborhood groups for projects that benefit the community. Rotary Club of Space Center has agreed to partner with ABNC to provide a source of labor for the Loop project.

The Discovery Loop accessibility project will provide improved access to the Loop for people that have disabilities and parents with children in strollers. The Discovery Loop is a series of boardwalks, trails, teaching platforms, educational signage and displays that traverse around the core of ABNC. The boardwalks and platforms are generally wheel chair accessible. The trails, however, must be maintained and occasionally resurfaced to remain wheel chair or stroller friendly.

The educational signage and exhibits within the Discovery Loop teach people about the importance of nature and preservation of nature. A visit to the Nature Center allows people to "reconnect with nature" without leaving the very urban and industrialized Houston metroplex.
