His trip started on Thursday with lunch with The College of the Governors downtown at The Grove. The President and the College of Governors were provided an update of all the happenings within the District.

Next was a spectacular evening with over 600 of the District's Rotarians, family and friends at the Bayou City Event Center, for the District 5890 All Club Meeting. President Tanaka enjoyed a reception with Major Donors and VIP Guests before touring the over 30 exhibits of the clubs' projects. He spent time looking at all the great projects our clubs are working on and asked many questions. President Tanaka was extremely impressed at the wide array of project the clubs are undertaking to serve their communities.

The All Club Meeting was opened by the Youth Exchange students with their flag ceremony. The event, hosted by Art Rascon, was a celebration of 100 years of service, highlighted by the Rotary Club of Houston's 100th Anniversary and the 50th Anniversary of the Robert E. Lee High School Interact Club in Baytown. The evening also our new honored Arch Klumph Society Members, John and Rose Moon. Dr. Jack Christie, Houston City Council Member At-Large, presented President Tanaka a proclamation proclaiming September 27, 2012 as President Tanaka Day in Houston.
