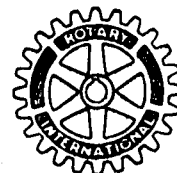

This concept of vocational service derives from the principle which is the very core of Rotary-the selection of members on the basis of classification. As a trustee of his classification, each Rotarian is obligated to share with others who are not Rotarians-and particularly with those others associated with him in business or profession-the realization that 'service is my business.' The course of each Rotarian is plainly marked. It is his job to communicate the ideal of Rotary-to explain its application to others in all of the relationships of his business or profession-and to help others to embody it in their daily decisions and practices." ## ROTARY COMMITTEES AT WORK.....

CLASSIFICATION COMMITTEE....Currently gathering a list of all potential classifications in area for membership eligibility.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE....Provisions for additional active members offer an excellent potential for club growth. Many Rotarians have business or professional associates in their own firms who are service-minded. NEW MEMBERS CHECKLIST.....If our club is to achieve a net membership gain, our club must perform well to attract new members and work to keep them. The new member's year is a crucial period for him. We should, therefore, provide effective procedures to insure that he:

- ....is made to feel welcome.

PAUL HARRIS FELLOW....You can become a Paul Harris Fellow by contributing \$1,000 or its equivalent to the Rotary Foundation. By this, you will help carry out the Foundation's aim of promoting friendly relations among people of different nations. You also may contribute towards the required amount over a period of ten years as part of the Paul Harris Sustaining Member plan.

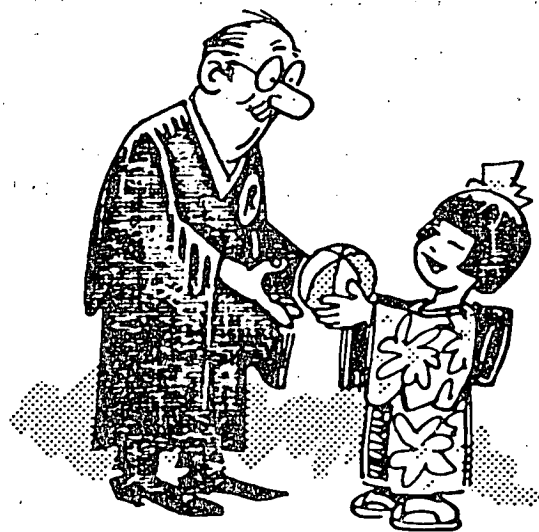
A visitor on campus asked a strolling student where the university library was located. "Sorry," said the student, "I'm here on a football scholarship."
